Christmas Message

from Peter Hills

Christmas is coming, the geese are getting fat. Please put a penny in the old man's hat. If you haven't got a penny, a ha'penny will do. If you haven't got a ha'penny, God bless you!

Yes, it is that time of year again. The Church's year is built around two cycles, one, probably the older, around the fifty days from Easter to Pentecost, and the other between 25 December and 6 January, the so-called Twelve Days of Christmas. Advent and Lent are the kids on the block, as it were, having been added later. Together, these two cycles, from Ash Wednesday to Pentecost and from Advent Sunday to Epiphany (some churches carry on to Candlemas on 2 February) take up more than a third of the year. The new liturgical year begins on Advent Sunday, when Mark's gospel gives way to Luke, as the main Sunday gospel. The cycle begins again.

Advent is interesting: It is a period in which Christmas has already started in schools and shops and television studios, and Christmas decorations are all around us. Christmas parties and Christmas concerts take place at this time, though the Christian festival – and the statutory holidays – don't take place before Christmas Day (which technically begins the night before). And then it's all over, except in the churches and homes which keep Christmas to the end. More of that later. Advent, which, as you probably know, means 'coming', is in two halves, as we celebrate it these days. For two weeks we remember the exalted Christ, and the promise of his second Coming; then we look forward to Christmas – the celebration of the Incarnation:

Our God, contracted to a span; Incomprehensibly made man.

Advent is the time of nativity plays and carol services, but also of pondering the meaning of the Christmas story, with the help of the great prophets of the Old Testament and the accounts of Matthew and Luke, and the wonderful poem which opens John's gospel. Christmas Day is a day to joyfully sing, as we do on Easter Day, not to think, so much as to wonder, and laugh and dance (metaphorically, at least). And we go on rejoicing until we celebrate the Epiphany, and the Baptism of Jesus.

I've never said this before, but Advent is, in a sense, part of Christmas. It is our time to think, to wrestle with what it all means, for us, and for this damaged, warring, unforgiving world, that 'God has spoken to us by a son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds,' and

that this Son would be poor and insignificant, a carpenter (or perhaps housebuilder!); who would perform amazing acts, all of them acts of love, who would teach a way of service and self-sacrifice for the sake of others, who would give new meaning to love of God and love of neighbour, who would die rejected and be raised from death. A human being, like us, born as a baby, as we were. Yet, as an old hymn reminds us, 'O Son of man, O more than man.' As I indicated in a recent Circuit letter, there is a common perception that the Christian festivals are simply the old pagan festivals taken over by the Church. Well, there was an ancient Roman pagan festival of the birth of the sun on 25 December, and it is possible that the western church did move Christmas — which was originally celebrated on 6 January — to oppose the pagan cult. It is true that that ancient pagan festival is still observed: but not in December. It is now known as Hallowe'en! Nor does Christmas Day fall on the Winter Solstice.

No, Christmas is Christmas, and always has been.

Even our commercial 'Christmas' has a Christian basis. The carols piped in the shops and on the radio still tell of a miraculous birth, of a baby in a feeding trough, of shepherds and angels, of wise men and dreams; and it is a time when people do put a penny in the old man's hat. A time of generosity and thoughtfulness and, yes, love.

Whether Christmas will be merry or sad for you this year, may it bring comfort and joy, healing and hope.

O come, O Day-spring, come and cheer Our spirits by your advent here; Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, And death's dark shadows put to flight: Rejoice! Rejoice! Immanuel shall come to you, O Israel!






Or you could buy a card One4all which can be purchased either at a post office or Sainsbury's (minimum £10).

A young minister was in the supermarket, when an attractive lady waved at him. Surprised, he said "Sorry, do I know you?"



SCAMS

The NCSC is urging shoppers to look out for:

Shoppers are being reminded that as scams are increasingly convincing, it is even more important to have basic security measures in place when it comes to email security, including switching on 2-step verification (2SV) and have a strong password made up of three random words.

Where possible, use a credit card when shopping online as this will offer you more protection if anything goes wrong, and follow our practical advice to help you shop online safely.

One in ten have first-hand experience of an electrical fire or shock caused by an electrical product they've bought online.

Online marketplaces, like eBay, Amazon Marketplace, Facebook Marketplace and Wish, are not currently required by law to check the safety of products sold on their sites, in the same way that traditional high street shops, such as John Lewis and Currys are.

The 'Don't Be Electricked' campaign is raising this issue as a matter of national urgency.

If you are not sure exactly who is communicating that text, email or phone call PLEASE do not respond

- Report suspicious text messages by forwarding them to 7726 (it's free of charge). 60,000 malicious websites have been removed as a result of suspicious text messages reported by the public.
- HMRC will never send notifications of a tax rebate or ask you to disclose personal or payment information by email. Received a suspicious email claiming to be from HMRC? Report it by forwarding the email to: phishing@hmrc.gov.uk
